Listening Session for the Proposed 2018 Diabetes Prevention Recognition Program (DPRP) Standards

he Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC's) National Diabetes Prevention Program will be hosting a listening session on the proposed 2018 Diabetes Prevention Recognition Program (DPRP) Standards on Wednesday, August 23, from 2:30-3:30 pm EST. The DPRP Standards are revised every three years to reflect current science and best practices. The proposed 2018 DPRP Standards have also been revised to align with the proposed Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services' Medicare Diabetes Prevention Program (MDPP) rule found here. During this call, CDC experts will provide a high-level overview of the proposed DPRP Standards. Participants are encouraged to review changes to the proposed Standards prior to the call, found here. Therefore, ensuring that all American Indians and Alaska Natives (Al/ANs) achieve the highest level of health possible will require broadspectrum action that goes beyond addressing individual determinants and disease management to include action to address such disadvantages.

The changing landscape of public health, with a multi-disciplinary approach focused on the social determinants of health, is a true opportunity to advance the well-being of Al/AN communities. The National Indian Health Board (NIHB), in partnership with the NPA, has taken a proactive and strategic approach to building the public health capacity of tribal health departments through information gathering and dissemination, capacity building, and awareness raising.
